TUNING INTO KIDS IS BACK TERM 1 in 2020

The very popular parenting program Tuning Into Kids will be returning in 2020. Paul Fry will facilitate this 6 week program once a week on a set night and it will run for 2 hours each week (in the past this program was run on a Thursday night from 7-9pm). Tuning Into Kids is a program about Emotional Intelligence - It helps to build parent/carer capacity in responding to a child's different emotions so that you can resolve issues quicker than usual and strengthen the relationship with the child in the process.
