## A word from Mrs Skee...

As you may be aware attending meetings is an important part of a teacher's role. For me I not only attend meetings with parents, students and members of the local community, but I also attend a number of meetings with my colleagues. Each Thursday at 12.15 I meet with the school leadership team, which is made up of; Mr Nick Walsh, Mr Matthew Dubois, Mrs Debbie

Richardson, Mrs Lara Gibbons and Mr Paul Fry to discuss matters that relate to our whole school Strategic plan. Most recently, Mr Nick Walsh and I have also begun to participate in Professional Learning team meetings. These meetings are held each Tuesday (Numeracy focus) and Thursday (Literacy focus) and focus on developing teacher's professional learning. These meetings are very student data driven and allow teachers to provide learning that is tailored to each student's point of need. On Friday the 21st of February I will be attending a PLT professional development session with the school's numeracy leaders (Mrs Elizabeth Acreman, Mrs Paige Frendo, Ms Emily Gibson) and Matthew Dubois (our Numeracy Learning Specialist) to further develop my learning in this area. Mr Nick Walsh will be attending a similar session with our Literacy Leaders (Ms Jessie Foster, Ms Jess Hurley and Mr James Kuchel). I hope to start featuring profiles on our amazingly talented staff in future newsletters.

Friday the 14th of February – This Friday we will be holding a very special assembly starting at 2.15pm in our school assembly area. This assembly will formally present our School Captains, Vice School Captains and House Captains to the school. We will be joined for this presentation by our 2014 school leaders. This assembly will also see the launch of our new Respectful Roo postcards which were printed due to the generous support of Energy Australia. At the culmination of this assembly we will be holding two very special pop up shops; a fairy floss (\$2 a bag) and cans of drink (\$1 a can) stall and a stall by student Elissa Mayes featuring scrunchies (\$5 each or 5 for \$20), pet bandanas (\$7-\$9) and heated rice bags (\$6) for sale. The sale of the fairy floss and cans of drink will go to support our ongoing library refurbishment and a percentage of the sales from Elissa's stall will go to Challenge (Supporting children with cancer) and Grounded Paws Animal rescue. **Improvements around NEPS –** it is always exciting when I see all of the ongoing improvements that are being made around NEPS. In recent weeks we have seen; measurements taken for new classroom reading spaces in various classrooms, new storage purchased for the BER building, garden work occurring as well as the continued upgrade to our school library. Mr Walsh, Ms Jenni Boyes and I have almost finished relocating our library books from our old shelving to the new and on Friday we will have new display areas put up as well as a 75 inch screen that will be utilised in student lessons, staff professional development and parent information nights. I can't wait to be able to announce the official opening of our new library in a few weeks. PS - also keep an eye out for some exciting changes to our front office area which are coming soon!!!!!

**School fundraising** – In order to make things happen around our school we often rely on our fundraising efforts. Art Specialist teacher, Ms Kathy Mewett leads our fundraising team. Over the years money raised from fundraising has allowed us to purchase new technology for our students, new playground equipment, new library signage as well as a new BBQ. Please make sure that your child is wearing sunscreen on the day and has covered up between events, as we don't want anyone getting burnt. If you child needs goggles please make sure they have these already adjusted and ready to go.

- Thongs or sandals should be packed for footwear at the pool as the ground is very hard.
- Hats are a must!!
- Students need to sit in the shade as much as possible.
- Students need to bring a refillable water bottle so they remain well hydrated.
- Students in grade P-2 will return to school around 12.30-1.00pm
- Students in Grades 3-6 will be at the pool all day returning around 2.30-3.00pm.

This year all students who participate in the carnival will receive a participation ribbon. Only students in senior races will receive place ribbons.

Students competing in races need to use the correct stroke technique to the best of their ability and not push off from the bottom of the pool or grab lane ropes. Students who compete in breastroke and butterfly will only be put through to the next level if their strokes are deemed acceptable by stroke judges.
